Dear Neighbor,

EVER GET SO WORKED UP about an issue that you wanted to write your Congressman? Save the stamp and come to the October 19 West Walker Civic Association meeting at the Chicago Latvian Community Center at 4146 N. Elston Avenue. Don't forget that meetings now start at 7 p.m.

Mike Quigley is our congressman, representing the 5th Illinois District in Washington, DC. Although we can't guarantee Congressman Quigley will appear in person (but it is possible), his office will be definitely represented through a member of his district office staff, Bridget Geraghty.

Mike Quigley was elected to Congress to represent Illinois' 5th District in April 2009. Before that, he served as a Cook County commissioner for more than 20 years. During his time on the Cook County Board of Commissioners, Quigley sponsored every piece of major environmental legislation adopted by Cook County government and still regularly participates in local clean-up and restoration efforts, earning him awards from the Audubon Society and the Sierra Club. The Chicago Reader has said he is "arguably the greenest elected official in Chicago." He has lived in the Lakeview neighborhood for 30 years.

Congressman Quigley asked for the opportunity to present our neighbors with an update of his activities in Congress, to highlight areas of success and concern, and to give us the opportunity to provide feedback so that he can address the concerns of our neighborhood and the entire district. Congressman Quigley would like to hear your questions and suggestions.

I'd like to encourage everyone to come and be an active participant in our representative government. If you would like to learn firsthand how the concerns of West Walker get heard in Washington, DC, please attend the October meeting. Who knows, you might even meet a congressman. (A message from Congressman Quigley appears below.)

LAST YEAR when I was elected to represent the people of the 5th District, I vowed to stop business as usual in Washington. To this end, in July 2009 I introduced H.R. 3427, the State Ethics Law Protection Act (SELPA). After months of work, this legislation passed through the House of Representatives on September 29.

SELPA will allow states that enact anti-pay-to-pay laws, like Illinois, to continue receiving federal funds from the Federal Highway Administration. Pay-to-play is the practice of trading campaign contributions for lucrative government contracts, a practice that hurts Illinois taxpayers and limits the competitive bidding process. SELPA clarifies that anti-pay-to-play laws are consistent with federal contracting requirements, ensuring future projects will be chosen based on merit rather than political connections and favors.

WWCA General Meeting Minutes

From September 21, 2010

The meeting opened at 7:11 p.m. Board members Dorie Westmeyer, Mike Webber, Davor Engel, and Carol Barry were present.

The speaker was Dr. Richard Tarabey from Swedish Covenant Hospital. He spoke about sleep apnea, a common sleep disorder of one or more pauses in breathing or shallow breaths during sleep. Breathing pauses can last from a few seconds to a few minutes. Interrupted sleep can cause many problems including high blood pressure, cardiac problems, memory problems, increased insulin resistance, and workplace accidents.

Adults need at least six hours of sleep and teenagers need even more. Nutrition is very important for sleep and heart health. Heart disease soared in the past century because of sedentary lifestyles and heavily processed foods. Fall and Winter Preparation

WHAT A DIFFERENCE a month makes! The weather has cooled off, and the nights are falling below 55 degrees. It's nearly time to bring in the tropical plants you want to save for next year.

I over-winter figs, bananas, oranges, lemons, and limes in their containers. Meyer lemon trees even flower and bear fruit indoors, and the flowers smell wonderful something to liven up the house during the grey months.

My thoughts are already turning to weatherization. It's time to get out the caulk, the weather-stripping, and the plastic window sheets. They can really add a good insulating layer to leaky windows.

Time to walk around your house and do your checklist. Check your furnace, and replace the filter if necessary. Think about energy-saving window blinds or drapes.

There are some interesting and innovative solar solutions out there, if you are willing to try something new. I bought a roll of solar reflective fabric I'm going to try on my windows—promises to keep heat in and cold out!

In September I attended the rollout workshop for the free, low-cost weatherization kits. The kits are in very limited supply, so we don't know yet if everyone who requests them will get them, but I will be placing my request for our neighborhood this week.

If anyone is interested in volunteering to help with the training and distribution, please let me know. If you'd like a kit, please also let me know. If we get them, I'd expect availability to be around November.

School-Supply Distribution a Success

The Irving Park Community Food Pantry thanks everyone who contributed to our Back-to-School distribution. Almost 400 children received a good selection of paper, notebooks, pencils, markers, and other supplies.

Nutrition Classes Begin: The Pantry's fall series of nutrition classes began October 6. Conducted by Alicia Theofanis of the University of Illinois Extension Services, the classes teach clients how to create nutritious and tasty meals especially focused on the produce, canned goods, and other foods they receive in their three- to five-day distribution from the Pantry.

Laptop Donation Speeds Link Cards: The Pantry will be receiving a laptop computer from the Greater Chicago Food Depository that will help qualify clients for instant acceptance for Express Stamps and an Illinois Link card. The Pantry is the only location in Cook County where those who qualify via online application can receive immediate approval and receive their Link card within a few days. To date, more than 100 clients have received their Link cards through the Pantry.

New Toy Donations Needed: The Pantry is collecting new children's toys for its annual holiday distribution. Please bring donations to the Grace Street entrance (3801 N. Keeler) during regular business hours.


West Walker Hits the Links
